



CLaSIC 2010: INDIVIDUAL CHARACTERISTICS AND SUBJECTIVE VARIABLES IN LANGUAGE LEARNING

Over the decades, research has rejected views of learners as passive processors and highlighted instead their subject roles in learning. It is evident to researchers and practitioners that learner characteristics such as age, gender, aptitudes, motivation, beliefs, metacognition and learning strategies contribute directly or indirectly to learning processes and outcomes. In view of the vast differences between individuals, each learner biography becomes in effect an individual case study. Yet these individual characteristics and subjective variables interact with factors external to the learners, including especially the cultural background, social environment and educational context, thus underlining the fact that learners are, at the same time, social beings. In selecting this theme, CLaSIC 2010 acknowledges the undoubted importance of learners' – and teachers' – individual characteristics for foreign language education. It hopes to engage participants in a fruitful and rewarding discussion of these issues and to draw insightful conclusions for research and practice.
